oin us in congratulating Monica Raphael (Anishinaabe / Sičáŋğu Lakota), who is the Thomas G. and Susan C. Hoback curator of Great Lakes Native art, cultures and community engagement at the Eiteljorg. A longtime artist, Monica entered one of her works into the prestigious Santa Fe Indian Market Best of Show competition. On Aug. 16, her piece won Best in Classification in Beadwork and Quillwork. Monica's extraordinary piece draws inspiration from a beaded saddle in the Eiteljorg's collections of Native art.

Having won many awards for her beadwork and quillwork designs, Monica Raphael participated in the Eiteljorg Indian Market and Festival multiple times before joining the Eiteljorg staff as Hoback curator in 2023.

Top statewide PR award goes to Storyteller magazine

he magazine you are reading, the Eiteljorg's Storyteller, won a statewide award for best periodical for the fourth year in a row. The Public Relations Society of America-Hoosier Chapter held its annual Pinnacle Awards on June 12. PRSA awards are presented in several categories to recognize top achievements in the public relations industry in Indiana. Contest judges were from the PRSA chapter in Hawaii, and the Eiteljorg competed along with big PR firms, other nonprofits and universities. The three issues of Storyteller magazine from 2023 received the top honor in the periodicals category, the Pinnacle Award, which recognizes quality of writing and visuals, effectiveness in messaging and editorial judgment.

The Storyteller team recognized for the 2023 issues of the magazine included editor Bryan Corbin, graphic designer Mike Fasig of Honeymoon Image & Design and digital marketing manager Brooke Sullivan. Also recognized were several former employees: past vice president for advancement Nataly

Lowder, past director of marketing and communications Bert Beiswanger, past digital marketing manager Dani Vasquez, and past marketing intern Camryn Daniels. Receiving this prestigious award yet again is a reflection of the effort that goes into the *Storyteller* magazine, directly or indirectly, from staff throughout the museum.


vice president for curatorial affairs and collections. This pivotal role will play a key part in shaping the future of our exhibitions and collections.

reston Singletary: Raven and the Box of Daylight, a critically acclaimed exhibition by an internationally renowned Tlingit artist, opens Nov. 8 at the Eiteljorg Museum. In a departure from traditional exhibitions, Raven and the Box of Daylight is an immersive experience in which works of glass tell the story of how the Tlingit cultural hero Raven brought light to his people.

The Eiteljorg, home to one of the largest collections of contemporary Native art in the world, is the only Midwest destination this year for Raven and the Box of Daylight. In the exhibition, artist Preston Singletary (Tlingit) creates a "must-see-it-to-believe-it" experience. The smooth glowing sculptures of Raven and other central figures from Tlingit oral tradition have a fluid, lifelike quality. An ethereal soundscape and lighting effects fill the exhibit's five sections.

"Preston Singletary is a prolific contemporary Native artist whom I have admired for a long time," Eiteljorg President and CEO Kathryn Haigh said. "We are honored and excited to welcome this mesmerizing exhibition for



our visitors to experience."

Based in Seattle, Singletary blends European glassblowing with Northwest Native themes from his Tlingit culture, such as transformation, animals and shamanism. Having studied glass art at the Pilchuck Glass School co-founded by glass sculpture icon Dale Chihuly, Singletary was trained by Venetian glassmaking masters; he also studied Scandinavian design in Sweden. His artworks are in the collections of major museums worldwide.

"Preston Singletary is an extraordinarily important contemporary Native artist whose virtuosity we are thrilled to celebrate," said Dorene Red Cloud (Oglala Lakota), Eiteljorg curator of Native American art. "Those who are not already familiar with his work will become his admirers after experiencing his adaptation of how Raven brought light to the Tlingit, and Singletary will gain much more recognition — recognition that he deserves."

A modern retelling

The Tlingit people live primarily in Alaska. Singletary's artistic vision uses



modern materials to retell a Tlingit story that has been passed down through countless generations, in which Raven — also named Yéil, a Trickster — used his clever abilities to bring the sun, moon and stars to his people who had been dwelling in darkness. The artist developed his glass sculptures of Raven and other key figures in the story while collaborating with a culture bearer, the late Walter Porter (Tlingit, 1944–2013). With approximately 63 glass sculptures, the immersive exhibition has appeared

in six major art museums, with the Eiteljorg the first in this region to host it.

Longtime Eiteljorg Museum supporters will recognize Singletary's work and design style. One of his glass sculpture pieces, *Land Otter Encounter*, (2012), is now on view in the Eiteljorg's Native American Galleries. Singletary was one of the artists prominently featured in a 2017 TV documentary the Eiteljorg co-produced with WFYI in Indianapolis, *Native Art Now!*, about the Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship.

"I am honored that Raven and the Box of Daylight received extended interest by more museums in showing the work, beyond the initial scheduled venues. When it began in 2018 it was a monumental effort to create such a large body of work and synchronize

all the elements," Singletary said. "I'm excited to be hosted by the Eiteljorg Museum. As a Native artist, I've known about their Contemporary Art Fellowship for 20 years, and I'm looking forward to seeing the museum and learning more about how they collect and support contemporary Native art."

Preston Singletary: Raven and the Box of Daylight is organized by the artist and Museum of Glass in Tacoma, Washington, and is guest curated by Miranda Belarde-Lewis (Zuni Pueblo / Tlingit), Ph.D. The multisensory visitor experience was designed by zoe | juniper.

The exhibition at the Eiteljorg is funded in part by the Arthur Jordan Foundation and Robert Lehman Foundation with additional support from numerous museum donors; Raymond James, Citizens Energy Group, Indiana Humanities and National Endowment for the Humanities are sponsors at the Eiteljorg.

Raven and the Box of Daylight is an ideal exhibition for repeat visits, as there is so much to experience and guests will want to return and bring friends to see it, too. Continuing from Nov. 8, 2024, through March 9, 2025, at the Eiteljorg, the exhibition is included with regular admission.

Native cultures celebrated at unforgettable events Oct. 14 and Nov. 9

ancing, singing, intricately carved masks and stunning regalia are just a few highlights of a not-to-bemissed Indigenous Peoples' Day program focused on the arts of Native peoples of the Northwest Coast on Monday, Oct. 14, when admission is free.

Longtime Eiteljorg enthusiasts may remember high-energy performances by the Git-Hoan Dancers (People of the Salmon), a group founded by Tsimshian carver, singer and dancer David Albert Boxley. Utilizing handcarved masks, wood and skin drums, and handmade regalia, the Git-Hoan Dancers depict characters in the stories of the Tsimshian First Nations People. They first appeared at the Eiteljorg Indian Market and Festival in the 1990s, and have delighted audiences across the world, including at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival in Washington D.C.

David A. Boxley is an acclaimed artist, having carved more than 80 totem poles, countless bentwood

boxes, masks, drums, rattles and many other traditional Tsimshian pieces that can be found in museums and private collections. Under his teaching, his eldest son David Robert Boxley has also gone on to an illustrious career as an artist and culture bearer.

Well-known for his carvings and paintings, David R. Boxley works in the distinctive Formline design style unique to Pacific Northwest Native American art. He will conduct art demonstrations, sharing his remarkable talent during Indigenous Peoples' Day programming.

Tsimshian beadwork artist and weaver Kandi McGilton will demonstrate for audiences the Annette Island style of basket weaving, an endangered art form from the southern Alaskan coast. Kandi was a student of master weavers and is a self-taught beadwork artist. She is best known for her award-winning octopus or "devilfish" bags.

Indigenous Peoples' Day at the Eiteljorg is a great way to learn about the arts of Native peoples of the Pacific Northwest, ahead of the Nov. 8 opening of *Preston Singletary: Raven and the Box of Daylight.*


Dante Biss-Grayson Fashion Show Nov. 9.

An artist, poet, activist and U.S. Air Force veteran, Biss-Grayson turned to painting to work through traumas he experienced during multiple deployments and to bring attention to important issues impacting Native communities. His talents evolved and blossomed, and in collaboration with his wife Yanti, Sky-Eagle Collection Fashion House was born.

Biss-Grayson's designs have graced the red carpet on stars such as Amber Midthunder of *Prey* and Jillian Dion of *Killers* of the Flower Moon; and on runways in London, New York, Cannes and Santa Fe. His collection is contemporary, modern, and includes both men's and women's clothing, belts and accessories.

Día de Muertos Community Celebration: a free, festive mix of music, dance and art

oin us Oct. 26 for the Eiteljorg Museum's 12th annual Día de Muertos Community Celebration. What began as a partnership with Nopal Cultural more than a decade ago has grown exponentially into one of the biggest Day of the Dead celebrations locally. Thousands attend and enjoy the mariachi orchestra music. traditional dance and cultural vibes. Visitors are captivated by the Catrina parade of elaborately dressed models. Best of all, admission to the family-friendly event is free.

At this year's event, organized in partnership with Arte Mexicano en Indiana, you can browse Mercado vendors, purchase delicious Pan de Muerto bread and colorful jewelry and accessories, and make art with Artist in Residence Richard Gabriel, Jr. During the celebration, take time to view the Community Art and Altar Exhibit, open Oct. 7-Nov. 3 inside the

museum's Ruth Lilly Theater. It features ofrendas, or intricately decorated altars, created by local community partners, including the Consulado de México en Indianápolis, the Indianapolis Central Library, Mujeres Conectadas en Indy, Christ Church Cathedral and more. At a community altar, you can add a note to honor the memory of a loved one. And, take in an exhibit of Día de Muertos artworks by Luis Fitch.

Traditions behind the celebration

With roots going back thousands of years to Indigenous traditions in Mexico, Día de Muertos gathers communities together to celebrate and remember loved ones who have passed on. The traditions have evolved and diversified over the centuries, and the holiday - also known as Day of the

Dead — is now celebrated across Mexico, the U.S. and in many other countries. Familiar motifs often associated with the holiday are calaveras, or sugar skulls, and cempasúchil, or marigold flowers — both of which have deep cultural meanings you can learn about Oct. 26.

In any modern Día de Muertos celebration, music is central - specifically performances by a mariachi orchestra. Mariachi instruments include the vihuela, a fivestring guitar, the guitarrón, a large fretless six-string bass guitar, a standard six-string guitar, violins and trumpets.

As important as their instruments are the eyecatching outfits that mariachi orchestra musicians wear: the traje de charro, the attire of the cowboys of Jalisco. The musicians' matching outfits include white shirts, tight ornamented trousers, boots,

wide bow ties, sombreros and short jackets. Traditionally, mariachi ensembles are all male, but by the early 21st century, all-female mariachi groups have formed around the globe. Women's mariachi ensembles often have a slightly altered outfit, either a modified version of the traje de charro, or the china poblano, which includes an embroidered blouse, a long colorful skirt and a rebozo (shawl).

This year at the Eiteljorg's free celebration, we are incredibly excited to welcome Chicago-based Mariachi Sirenes to our celebration. This all-female mariachi group's mission is to bring together the women of their hometown for the art of mariachi. They play concerts all over Chicago and have performed the national anthem prior to a Chicago Bulls game. Join us at 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. Oct. 26 to hear this amazing group of women! And don't miss the other music and dance performances of the Día de Muertos Community Celebration. Details about all the performers and vendors are at Eiteljorg.org/Dia-de-Muertos.

Lo que comenzó como una asociación con Nopal Cultural hace más de una década ha crecido exponencialmente hasta convertirse en las mayores celebraciones locales del Día de los Muertos. Miles de personas asisten y disfrutan de la orquesta de música de mariachis, bailes tradicionales y notas culturales. Los visitantes quedan cautivados por el desfile de Catrinas. Lo mejor de todo es que la entrada es gratuita.

En el evento de este año. organizado en colaboración con Arte Mexicano en Indiana, podrás echar un vistazo a los vendedores del Mercado, comprar un delicioso Pan de Muerto y coloridas joyas y accesorios, y podrás hacer arte con el artista en residencia Richard Gabriel, Durante la celebración, tómate el tiempo para ver el Arte de la Comunidad y la exhibición de Altares, abierta del 7 de oct. al 3 de nov. en el Teatro Ruth Lilly del museo. En ella se exponen ofrendas o altares intrincadamente decorados, creados por aliados de la comunidad local, incluyendo el Consulado de México en Indianápolis, la Biblioteca Central de Indianápolis, Mujeres Conectadas en Indy, la Čatedral Christ Church v más. En un altar comunitario se puede añadir una nota

para honrar la memoria de un ser querido. Y disfrute viendo una exhibición de obras de arte del Día de Muertos de Luis Fitch.

Tradiciones detrás de la celebración

Con raíces milenarias en las tradiciones indígenas de México, el Día de Muertos reúne a las comunidades para celebrar y recordar a los seres queridos que han fallecido. Las tradiciones han evolucionado y se han diversificado a lo largo de los siglos, se celebra en México, Estados Unidos y muchos otros países. Los adornos tradicionales asociados a la celebración son calaveras, calaveras de azúcar y las flores de cempasúchil, o caléndula — ambos con profundos significados culturales que puedes conocer el 26 de oct.

En cualquier celebración moderna del Día de Muertos, la música ocupa un lugar especial, especialmente con apariciones de una orquesta de mariachis. Los instrumentos del mariachi son la vihuela, una guitarra de cinco cuerdas, el guitarrón, un gran bajo de seis cuerdas sin trastes, una guitarra de seis cuerdas, violines y trompetas.

Tan importantes como sus instrumentos son los llamativos trajes que visten los músicos de las orquestas de mariachis: el traje de charro, el atuendo de los vaqueros de Jalisco. Los trajes combinados de los músicos incluyen camisas blancas, pantalones ajustados con adornos, botas, moños, sombreros y chaquetas cortas. Tradicionalmente, los mariachis son hombres, pero a principios del siglo XXI se han formado grupos femeninos en todo el mundo. Las mariachis mujeres suelen llevar un atuendo ligeramente modificado, ya sea una versión modificada del traje de charro o la china poblana, que incluye una blusa bordada, una falda larga y colorida y un rebozo.

Eiteljorg Museum mourns the passing of President Emeritus John Vanausdall, who left a lasting legacy

emories came flooding back for many people in Indianapolis and beyond when they learned John Vanausdall had died Aug. 17 at age 68. They admired his decades of service and leadership as President and CEO of the Eiteljorg Museum and all he accomplished leading the institution through his business acumen, integrity and high ethical standards. Many of the stories about Vanausdall reflect his kindness, empathy, well-rounded personality and ability to get to know people, his enthusiasm for a wide range of subjects including art, design, music and the outdoors, and most of all his love of family and friends.

During nearly 27 years as Eiteljorg President and CEO until his retirement in June 2023, Vanausdall transformed the museum in downtown Indianapolis. He led the institution through unprecedented growth in its collections, exhibitions and public programming, enabled by expansion and renovation of the museum and growth of the operating endowment. Under his tenure, the Eiteljorg developed a national reputation for excellence in Native American art and art of the American West, with special emphasis on contemporary expressions of both. He helped the museum forge deep working relationships with

artists, scholars and Native leaders and culture bearers. And he cultivated the support of museum donors in central Indiana and across the nation.

An esteemed leader

Vanausdall joined the Eiteljorg as President and CEO in October 1996, after 18 years in the creative and management areas of The Children's Museum of Indianapolis. His people skills and deft diplomacy served him well at the Eiteljorg: in raising funds from donors for large projects, taking an interest in artists and their careers, working with the Board of Directors in developing and executing plans, leading staff, and making visitors feel welcome inside the museum. Vanausdall knew how to make strangers into friends, whether at a large museum gala or hosting a small gathering featuring his gourmet cooking. Always modest, he was quick to give all the credit to others, but his own accomplishments in leading a museum were substantial.

"This is a great loss for the Eiteljorg Museum and our entire community. John Vanausdall devoted decades to celebrating and uplifting the arts, histories and cultures of the Native

peoples of North America and all the diverse peoples of the American West," current Eiteljorg President and CEO Kathryn Haigh said. "His kindness and consideration towards others will long be remembered, and his strategic thinking that positioned the museum for the future will leave a lasting legacy. I feel fortunate to have known him, and I know all of us at the Eiteljorg will try to carry on his good work."

Vanausdall's tenure leading the Eiteljorg included four major multi-million-dollar capital/endowment campaigns, a four-fold increase in the museum's collections, reconstruction

and reinstallation of the museum's Native and Western galleries, and new emphasis on diversity, equity, accessibility and inclusion. Through obtaining commitments from donors, he grew the museum's endowment.

Under his watch, the museum launched cultural initiatives such as the biennial Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship, the annual Quest for the West® Art Show and Sale, the annual Juneteenth and Jazz and Día de Muertos community celebrations, and the Jingle Rails holiday model train display. The Indian Market and Festival and Artist in Residence program also expanded greatly under his leadership. Known as a master of strategy and fundraising, he oversaw the doubling of the building's public spaces in 2005 that included the addition of a children's discovery area, outdoor performance space and Museum Café. And, he was an esteemed

figure within the Indianapolis cultural arts community.

"John created an infrastructure that gave people opportunities. He wanted everyone to benefit. He was a good listener, a quiet person — it was never about him. It was about culture and the respect for it, about learning," said Eduardo Luna of Arte Mexicano en Indiana who co-created the Eiteljorg Día de Muertos Community Celebration. "John was a visionary and worked hard on establishing an equitable arts institution, an effort that had an impact inside and outside the Eiteljorg

Museum. The Mexican community in central Indiana and beyond benefited from this, and we are very grateful for his legacy. iMuchas gracias, John!"

Educator and influencer Tammy L. Cooper, Ph.D., approached the Eiteljorg in 2015 about starting a local Juneteenth event. It has grown and is now the Juneteenth and Jazz Community Celebration. "The Eiteljorg embraced me and welcomed me to celebrate this significant history of freedom," Cooper said. "After my years of working with the museum and celebrating history, John invited me to become a member of the Eiteljorg

Community Board of Advisors. I remember the virtual meeting, his humble demeanor and his great sense of humor. John expressed how pleased he was about the Juneteenth events that we have accomplished over the years."

Cooper added, "The celebration of Juneteenth continues to grow and become a signature event in the summer. I am grateful to have worked with John and to see the legacy of the Eiteljorg Museum family. As we mourn a compassionate and kind leader, I look forward to honoring his life and the great memories of his leadership. Well done, John Vanausdall."

A generalist, with empathy

Having grown up in Lebanon, Indiana, John Vanausdall was a skilled musician from an early age and played guitar

and other instruments. Graduating in 1978 from Indiana University-Bloomington with an education degree, John joined The Children's Museum of Indianapolis as a physical science educator. During 18 years at The Children's Museum, he advanced into leadership roles where he designed and developed exhibits and expansions and was involved in planning and fundraising. He earned his MBA in 1996 from IU Kelley School of Business, a few months before he was hired as the Eiteljorg Museum's President and CEO. At the time, the

Eiteljorg was a relatively young museum, having opened only seven years earlier.

Vanausdall went on to serve nearly 27 years leading the Eiteljorg — a remarkably long tenure.

"From the day the search committee chose John to lead the museum, it has been years of progress for the museum in every way. It was John's character and humanity that convinced the patrons to support the museum," said Stan Hurt, a longtime Eiteljorg Board member and former Board chair.

During his time as CEO, one of Vanausdall's friends and

mentors was Mel Perelman, an Eli Lilly & Company executive and an Eiteljorg Board chair. As philanthropists, Mel (who died in 2021) and his wife Joan provided major support to the Eiteljorg and gifted many artworks to the museum.

"Mel was one of the kindest and biggesthearted people I've ever known. But he was an exacting sort of person: Details mattered. Professionalism mattered. Ethics mattered," Vanausdall recalled in a 2022 interview, noting how Perelman exemplified the qualities that Vanausdall sought to bring to the museum himself.

Vanausdall balanced his hard work as museum executive with many outside interests he was passionate about: Performing on guitar (occasionally with an impromptu rock band of

Eiteljorg employees), photography, tennis, hiking in the grand landscapes of the American West (especially in Arizona where his grandchildren lived), designing and building woodworking projects, and improvising gourmet meals through what he called "creative cooking".

"My personal nature to be interested in lots of things probably feeds into that notion: Generalists are good leaders," Vanausdall said in the 2022 interview. "I think if I were overly interested in one thing, then I might not tend to delegate to those who are the experts. When you become a CEO or a senior executive, you're no longer doing the work; your job is to motivate others to do the work and support them."

His empathy for others shone through. Since his death, friends have independently shared anecdotes about Vanausdall unexpectedly visiting them in the hospital when they or their family members were undergoing treatment, or checking up on them when they were ill, or attending funeral visitations of their

loved ones to pay his respects.

"Of all the memories I have of working with John, the one of him visiting me in the hospital was a testament to his dedication to his patrons. He was a friend who I have had the pleasure to know for 27 years. I will miss his friendship and dedication to his career," Hurt added.

An indelible impact

Vanausdall also made an impression with museum employees and volunteers. We remember his gentle humor, the hint of

mischief in his eyes behind his owlish glasses when he'd said something amusing.

"John Vanausdall was an inspirational, yet down-to-earth leader. He was so genuine, positive, and kind. He lived his values with his open-door policy, collaborative decision-making, and participation in the Eiteljorg's extracurricular softball team and our band, the Eiteljorg Misfits," museum guest services manager Matt Askren recalled. "When I was in the hospital, John found out where I was and visited to see how I was doing. He genuinely cared about those around him, and that was shown through his actions and interactions. It's just who he was."

After he retired in June 2023, Vanausdall stayed in touch with his Eiteljorg colleagues. But the long retirement he'd worked hard

for lasted only 14 months, before his passing on Aug. 17. We remember the courage and dignity with which he faced his long final illness, and we are grateful for the indelible impact he left on the Eiteljorg Museum.

John Vanausdall is survived by his partner, Carrie Kirk, his adult daughters Emily McDuffie and Hannah Vanausdall, his four grandchildren, Carrie's two sons William and George, his former wife Jeanette Vanausdall, his sisters Anne Breedlove and Rita Barber, and extended family. John's wishes were that memorial contributions go to the John Vanausdall Capital Improvement Endowed Fund at the Eiteljorg. A complete obituary is at this link: https://tinyurl.com/4atmxwjr

"He was a teammate, band mate, true hero, and my friend. Words cannot fully express what he meant to me and others who knew him. He is missed. My condolences to his family," Askren said.

hen Michael Duty, founding director of the Eiteljorg Museum, passed away in April in Texas surrounded by family and friends, his wife, Laura, and daughter, Brynne, knew they wanted to honor his life and legacy. Their journey began with an email to our office. In speaking with Laura, we learned more about Michael than the museum's archival records could reveal.

Laura explained, "He loved nothing more than developing exhibitions, displays, literature, and programs that not only educate but provide opportunities for people to experience something that could be eye-opening and could expand their world."

Michael served as the inaugural executive director of the Eiteljorg Museum, overseeing its construction

and grand opening. Based in Indianapolis, he co-founded MuseumsWest, a collaborative network of prominent American Western art and history museums across the United States and Canada. According to his family, his role in establishing the Eiteljorg was his most significant professional accomplishment. He played a pivotal role in shaping the museum's vision and laying its foundation. Michael maintained a deep sense of pride in the Eiteljorg's ongoing growth and success as it continued to expand its collections and present exceptional exhibitions of Indigenous and Western art and cultural belongings.

Eiteljorg President and CEO Katie Haigh and I had several conversations and email exchanges with Laura to learn more about Michael and their family, as well as her goals for a meaningful and useful tribute to Michael's life and legacy. After carefully considering several options, Laura decided to create the Michael Duty Founding Director Endowment Fund for Internships, which will support internship opportunities at the museum, particularly in the curatorial and collections departments. She and Brynne hope others will consider supporting professional learning experiences for students with additional contributions to the fund.

"We are happy knowing this gift supports future generations of museum professionals. Michael tried to give everybody a chance to learn and a chance to grow. In my opinion, this gift is a continuation of that legacy," Laura told me via email after making her \$250,000 gift in his memory.



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Jim Morris, 81

uch has been written about the accomplishments of civic leader, businessman, public servant and philanthropist James T. "Jim" Morris, who died July 12. You probably know that Morris was vice chair of Pacers Sports & Entertainment and did much over the past 50 years to raise Indianapolis' profile as a sports and convention capital. He was former president of Lilly Endowment Inc., and later worked with the UN World Food Programme to fight hunger and

poverty in southern Africa and around the globe.

What you might not know is that Morris was a major supporter of the Eiteljorg Museum.

Jim Morris was one of the civic leaders who in the 1980s enabled the establishment of the Eiteljorg and the surrounding White River State Park. He supported efforts that brought a wide array of sporting events to downtown Indianapolis and helped launch Unigov and IUPUI. A member of the Eiteljorg Board of Directors from 2007-2013, Jim offered wisdom and insights to Eiteljorg committees.

An avid collector of art of the American West, he developed many personal friendships with Western artists. Jim and his wife Jackie supported the Eiteljorg from its start and frequently opened their home for museum events. Members since 1990 and Eagle Society donors, the Morrises supported Indian Market and Festival, the museum's annual fund, the Project New Moon capital campaign, the 20th and 25th Eiteljorg anniversary celebrations, the James Nottage Endowment Fund and the Quest for the West® Art Show and Sale.
