hanks to supporters such as you, the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art successfully navigated 2023, one of the most important years in the museum's history.

The museum progressed in 2023 because of your planned gifts to the Eiteljorg and its endowment, your corporate sponsorships and grant support, your membership and commitment of time, effort and finances, your donations of art and your continued friendship. Your support during the year allowed the

Eiteljorg to fulfill its mission to explore the intersection of the arts, histories and cultures of the past and present by sharing the diverse stories of the American West and the Indigenous Peoples of North America.

A significant development in the history of the museum was the June 2023 retirement of John Vanausdall after 27 years as Eiteljorg president and CEO. We were all profoundly saddened by his passing only 14 months later. But John's record of leadership at the museum — culminating in the successful completion of the \$55 million *Project 2021* capital/endowment campaign — will leave a lasting impact.

The retirement of one CEO after such a long tenure and arrival of a new CEO is a big step for any organization. We are grateful for your insights, recommendations, encouragement and for the hard work of the Eiteljorg employees and volunteers during this leadership change. The Eiteljorg has fresh energy to pursue new ideas and new approaches to fulfill our mission in a changing world while building on the strong foundation that John established.

Every guest who wanders through the Eiteljorg's galleries or attends one of our public programs is an important participant in the life of the museum. We work to cultivate lasting relationships with Eiteljorg guests, as today's first-time visitors can become tomorrow's active museum supporters.

Compelling exhibitions and public programs inspired museum guests. Many were fascinated by *Changing Views: The Photography of Dorothea Lange*, a traveling exhibition that included one of America's most iconic photographs, *Migrant Mother*. Strong interest in the arts and cultures of the Native peoples of North America drew visitors to the 31st annual Eiteljorg Indian Market and Festival in June 2023 and the Indigenous Peoples Day Community Celebration in October 2023. We were especially pleased that the 2023 Día de Muertos Community Celebration — jointly presented by the Eiteljorg and Arte Mexicano en Indiana — saw record single-day attendance of 5,588. Cutting-edge contemporary Native art was in the spotlight during the biennial Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship show, *UNSETTLE/Converge*, amplifying the voices of five important contemporary Native artists. More than \$1 million in Western art was sold during the 18th annual *Quest for the West®* Art Show and Sale. At year's end, families queued up during the holiday season to experience the Eiteljorg's annual model train display, the Fifth Third Bank *Jingle Rails: The Great Western Adventure*.

Behind the scenes, many efforts contributed to a remarkable year. The Board of Directors adopted the pillars of a new five-year strategic plan in January 2023 and several goals already have been implemented. The museum focused on optimizing the performance of its earned revenue units including external event rentals, admissions and the Frank and Katrina Basile Museum Store. This resulted in earned revenue increasing by 8 percent. Through 2023, the Eiteljorg maintained its commitment to Diversity, Equity, Accessibility and Inclusion by working together with the many communities it serves, including Native American, African American, Latiné, Asian American and LGBTQIA2S+ communities. In these efforts, we express particular thanks to all the foundations and grant-making institutions that supported the Eiteljorg in 2023, especially Lilly Endowment Inc. A full list appears later in this annual report. We also are thankful for the efforts of the Eiteljorg Board of Directors, the Community Board of Advisors, the talented, creative museum staff and dedicated volunteers who make the Eiteljorg one of the leading arts and culture institutions in the Midwest. And we are forever grateful to John Vanausdall for all he did to position the museum for the future.

In the following pages, we make the business case for why supporting the Eiteljorg and its endowment is a good investment. Whether you have been a friend of the Eiteljorg Museum for many years, or became a partner of the museum relatively recently, you have shared in this journey with us. This annual report is titled *Through Change, Opportunity* to underscore how your support continues to help the museum reach its potential. You make it all possible.



Year in Review

Community Engagement, 2023

goal of the Eiteljorg's strategic plan is to "strengthen authentic partnerships and collaborations." The museum has been engaged with the community in a myriad of ways for many years, but beginning in the summer and fall of 2023, the Eiteljorg hosted meetings with partners to have a conversation about what "partnership" means and how to reinforce and build strong reciprocal relationships. Through these various meetings, a few key themes arose.

Community partners wanted to feel welcome at the museum (and sometimes feeling welcome was as simple as offering an invitation to visit — perhaps for the first time). Partners also wanted access to space for community meetings, programs or events, and connections to resources — for instance, a connection to a Native artist for a community-based project. It became clear we needed to create a process and documentation for aspects of a good partnership. As a result, the museum's new Community Engagement Task Force was established.

This volunteer task force, chaired by Board member Allison Taylor, is made up of staff, Board and community members, each representing various local community interests and expertise — and all passionate about ways the Eiteljorg can enrich lives though community engagement efforts.



Diversified Revenue, 2023

The museum's long-term goal is to diversify its revenue streams. The help of donors and supporters is needed to achieve that. Gifts of all sizes comprised 55 percent of revenue during calendar year 2023. Earned revenue through ticket sales, event rentals, the museum store and café and other sources generated 23 percent, which was up 8 percent from the previous year. Friends of the museum — who included the Eiteljorg in their estate plans or whose endowment gifts were made during their lifetimes — provided another 22 percent. The museum's goal is to balance out this three-legged stool and make the three main revenue sources largely equivalent, approximately one-third each. Supporters such as you can make that possible.

Collections Highlights of 2023

he Eiteljorg Museum collection is composed of art of Native North America and art of the American West. During the museum's first 34 years, the overall collection has grown dramatically — and includes an extensive collection of Native American art representing approximately 530 of the 574 federally recognized tribes. The Western American art collection continues to grow in diversity as well.

In 2023, the Eiteljorg Museum continued to add to its impressive collections of Native American and Western artworks through key acquisitions, including purchases from artists, gifts and bequests. These gifts have added prominence to the collections and supported the artworks' ongoing care.

The Eiteljorg is especially grateful to collectors who over the years have donated multiple works – or sometimes entire collections — to the museum, either through gifts made during their lifetimes, or bequests after their passing. In 2023, there were important gifts from collectors:

In loving memory of Harry Fonseca who was his partner, Harry S. Nungesser gifted 21 artworks by Fonseca (Nisenan Maidu / Portuguese / Hawaiian, 1946-2006). Fonseca was a 2005 Eiteljorg Fellow, and the gift includes significant Fonseca works such as *Coyote & the Painted Cave, Coyote Dancing* and *Rose's Dress* as well as prints, drawings, paintings, and a group of Tohono O'odham miniature baskets.

Joan Perelman and the late Mel Perelman have continued to donate their Native American and Western art collection to the Eiteljorg Museum. At the end of 2023 they gifted 166 items to the museum, including ceramics, textiles and folk art, as well as a group of paintings and sculptures by Western artists.

Mark and Julie Dalrymple gifted 10 Native American items, including sculpture, baskets and fans by artists such as Tim Paul (Nuu-Chah-Nulth Hesquiaht First Nation), Diane Douglas Willard (Haida), Jared Kane (Southern Tutchone / Tlingit), Bill Henderson (Wei Wai Kum Kwakwaka'wakw First Nation), and Kevin C. Horne (Tsimshian). In 2023, in honor of John Vanausdall's retirement as president and CEO, Helen Cox Kersting gifted a necklace by Preston Singletary (Tlingit, born 1963).

The Westbrook Family — Mackie, Sandy, René and Gillian — bequeathed 41 Native American artworks to the museum, including but not limited to artwork by these artists: Jennifer Tafoya (Santa Clara Pueblo), Wallace Novella (Hopi Tribe), Ross Henderson (Kwakwaka'wakw 'Namigis First Nation), Matthew Yellowman (Navajo), and Inez Ortiz (Cochiti Pueblo).

The museum purchased four beaded pieces, representing brain scans, from Invited Fellow Ruth Cuthand, (Plains Cree, born 1954), titled *ADHD*, *Depression*, *Anxiety*, and *Schizophrenia*.

Two artists at the 2023 Indian Market and Festival were honored with the Harrison Eiteljorg Purchase Awards, and the museum acquired their award-winning works: Kelly Church (Gun Lake Tribe of Potawatomi Indians, born 1967), for *When the Stars & Dawn Collide*, and Aydrian Day (Ho-Chunk / Anishinaabe / Lakota, born 2010), for *Aadizookewin*, the *Storyteller*. The latter work by Day, a youth artist, was purchased for the museum with funds provided by anonymous donors.

The museum purchased other items for the collection:

The Kiefer, Rivas and Ellsworth pieces and one of the McClellan photographs subsequently went on view during the 2024 exhibition, *Acts of Faith: Religion and the American West.*

At the 18th annual *Quest for the West*® Art Show and Sale in 2023, an acrylic painting by Donna Howell-Sickles (American, born 1949), *Waiting for the Boot to Drop,* won the *Quest* Harrison Eiteljorg Purchase Award, and was acquired by the museum.

The Eiteljorg Museum has an active lending program. In 2023, the museum loaned a number of works to various exhibitions at other museums. Two works by 1999 Eiteljorg Fellow Jaune Quick-to-See-Smith (Confederated Salish and Kootenai Nation, born 1940), Sunlit (C.S. 1854) and Paper Dolls for a Post Columbian World with Ensembles Contributed by the U.S. Government traveled to the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York City, the Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth, and Seattle Art Museum for the exhibition Jaune Quick-to-See-Smith: Memory Map. Ten photographs from the series Portraits Against Amnesia by 2003 Eiteljorg Fellow Hulleah Tsinhnahjinnie (Taskigi (Bear Clan) / Diné (Tsinajinnie Clan), born 1954) were lent to the exhibition Reclaiming Home: Contemporary Seminole Art at the John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art in Sarasota, Florida.

A painting by 2009 Eiteljorg Fellow Jim Denomie (Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe, 1955-2022), Edward Curtis, Paparazzi: Chicken Hawks, traveled in the exhibition The Land Carries Our Ancestors: Contemporary Native Artists, for display at the National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C. and the New Britain Museum of American Art in New Britain, Connecticut.

Looking ahead, in 2024 and 2025 the Eiteljorg's acquisitions of artworks continue. Acquisitions can occur through the Harrison Eiteljorg Purchase Awards at both Indian Market and Festival and the *Quest for the West*® Art Show and Sale, as well as through the biennial Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship awards, and through other gifts, donations and purchases. n 2023, the Eiteljorg Museum experienced its first major leadership change at the top of the organization in decades.

Museum Welcomes New President and CEO Kathryn Haigh

In March of 2023, after a yearlong executive search, the Eiteljorg Museum's Board of Directors announced that Kathryn Haigh, a cultural arts leader with 28 years of museum experience, would become the museum's president and CEO upon John Vanausdall's retirement.

Haigh previously served as interim director and chief operating officer at the Indianapolis Museum of Art (IMA) at Newfields, where she managed art collections, exhibitions, conservation, security, facilities and other areas. Her experience with museum operations, strategic planning and community outreach efforts will prove invaluable at the Eiteljorg.

Haigh joined the IMA in 2007, gaining a wide range of experiences in several important management positions including chief registrar and deputy director. A graduate of the University of Cincinnati with a degree in art history, Haigh served as chief registrar, first at the Cincinnati Art Museum from 1994 to 2007 and then at the IMA from 2007 to 2010. As deputy director, she was promoted to increasing areas of responsibility. She became chief operating officer of IMA at Newfields in 2017 and became interim director and chief operating officer in 2021.

As president and CEO of the Eiteljorg, Haigh is responsible for community relations, donor stewardship, fundraising, strategic planning and curatorial, program and facilities management. She leads a staff of approximately 49 employees who are assisted by more than 200 volunteers. Community outreach, providing positive educational and museum experiences for underserved communities, diversifying collections and creating a new exhibit schedule have been high priorities for the new president and CEO.

During her first year in office, Haigh's efforts included implementing the new five-year strategic plan adopted by the Board in 2023, and finalizing wording of new museum mission, vision and values statements. She has supported several important projects, including transitioning the museum's budget to a July-to-June fiscal year, revamping the museum store, executing a long-awaited replacement of the building's 2nd floor HVAC system and making other changes to foster sustainability for the museum and grounds.

Kathryn Haigh and her partner Brad Sterling split their time between Indianapolis and Columbus, Ind. She also has an adult daughter, Madeleine, and son, Ryan.





The creation of the Eiteljorg Museum's five-year strategic plan for 2023-2027 was guided by a Strategic Planning Committee. 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The Christel DeHaan Family Foundation distributed a legacy gift of \$2.75 million to the Eiteljorg in November 2023, fulfilling wishes of the late Christel DeHaan (pictured), the prominent Indianapolis businesswoman, education-reform advocate and arts philanthropist, who died in 2020 at age 77. The gift went into the museum's endowment. Of that, \$2 million will be used specifically for general operating support of the institution's greatest needs. Also, \$750,000 of the endowment gift will be used to support living artists, such as Native American music and dance groups who perform at Indian Market and Festival, and artists in residence who engage with students of all ages throughout the year. As the DeHaan Family Foundation was winding down its operations three years after DeHaan's death, it distributed a total \$55 million to nonprofit arts organizations, among them the Eiteljorg, per DeHaan's wishes.

Remembering John Vanausdall Eiteljorg President and CEO from 1996 to 2023

The Eiteljorg Museum looks back with deep appreciation for and admiration of the life and career of John Vanausdall. He served for a remarkable 27 years as the museum's president and CEO, until his retirement June 30, 2023. Vanausdall passed away just over one year later, on Aug. 17, 2024, at age 68, having left an indelible legacy for the museum and the Indianapolis cultural community.

During his tenure as Eiteljorg president and CEO, Vanausdall transformed the museum in downtown Indianapolis. He led the institution through unprecedented growth in its collections, exhibitions and public programming, enabled by expansion and renovation of the museum and growth of the operating endowment. Under his tenure, the Eiteljorg developed a national reputation for excellence in Native American art and art of the American West, with special emphasis on contemporary expressions of both. He helped the museum forge deep working relationships with artists, scholars and Native leaders and culture bearers. And he cultivated the support of museum donors in central Indiana and across the nation.

Vanausdall came to the Eiteljorg in October 1996 after 18 years in the creative and management areas of The Children's Museum of Indianapolis. Among the highlights of his service at the Eiteljorg were:

- Completion of the \$55 million Project 2021 capital/endowment campaign, which raised \$40 million in cash and pledges for the museum's endowment; reimagining and reconstructing the Native American and Western art galleries; renovating the children's discovery area, the Nina Mason Pulliam Education Center; and expanding the multipurpose facility, the Allen Whitehill Clowes Sculpture Court.
- Doubling the Eiteljorg's public space in 2005 with the addition of the museum's \$20 million Mel and Joan Perelman Wing, the Museum Café and outdoor and indoor event spaces.

- Major growth in the museum's collections of both customary and contemporary Native American art, as well as art of the West, through important acquisitions, bequests and gifts, that built upon the original collection of museum founder Harrison Eiteljorg.
- Expanding museum initiatives that attract new audiences and groups, including the biennial Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship and the annual Indian Market and Festival, Juneteenth and Día de Muertos community celebrations, Quest for the West® Art Show and Sale, and the holiday model train display, Jingle Rails: The Great Western Adventure.
- Developing and maintaining the museum's financial support base through private philanthropy, donor relations and corporate sponsorships.
- Emphasizing a commitment to diversity, equity, accessibility and inclusion in the museum's exhibitions, public programs and internal processes.

Roger Eiteljorg, longtime Board member and son of the museum's founder Harrison Eiteljorg, said he first met Vanausdall in 1996, when he and other Board members were conducting a search for a President and CEO. At the time of the interview, Vanausdall was a vice president at The Children's Museum of Indianapolis. "We were all very impressed with John's demeanor and personality," Eiteljorg recalled. "John's ability to fundraise was in the realm of a superhero. During John's tenure, the museum grew from a local museum to a national cultural institution. His understanding of Western and Native American art was exceptional, and his respect for Native cultures was immense."

Vanausdall's 27 years of continuous service as president and CEO was exceptionally long in the museum field. His tenure also was noteworthy for his persistence and patience in cultivating friendships with donors, artists, civic leaders, members, volunteers and the general public in broadening the museum's engagement with the community. Vanausdall was especially known for his humor, kindness and empathy. As a busy museum executive, he nonetheless found time to make visits to museum supporters and employees when they were hospitalized, to pay his respects at funerals of their loved ones, and to send personal notes.

He held a 1978 education degree from Indiana University and a 1996 MBA from the IU Kelley School of Business. Often described as a Renaissance man, Vanausdall enjoyed many interests, including performing music on guitar, designing woodworking projects, photography, tennis, hiking and what he called "creative cooking."

John Vanausdall was the guest of honor at a retirement gala May 13, 2023, where many museum supporters, Board members and friends showed their appreciation for John and his lasting impact on the Eiteljorg. Staff and volunteers also donated funds to commission a formal oil portrait of Vanausdall, painted by longtime *Quest for the West®* artist Mark Kelso of Johnson County.

"For 27 years, John Vanausdall's name was synonymous with the Eiteljorg Museum. His influence and vision cannot be overstated," Roger Eiteljorg said. "The museum and the city of Indianapolis have lost a great friend and leader."

John Vanausdall is survived his partner, Carrie Kirk, his adult daughters Emily McDuffie and Hannah Vanausdall, his four grandchildren, his stepsons William and George Kirk, his former wife Jeanette Vanausdall, his sisters Anne Breedlove and Rita Barber, and extended family. Memorial contributions can be made to the John Vanausdall Capital Improvement Endowed Fund at the Eiteljorg, which will support needed efforts in the museum John worked so tirelessly to advance. Robert Anker

1941-2023

Robert A. Anker dedicated countless hours and his considerable talents to elevating arts and culture in central Indiana. Bob shared this passion with his wife of 55 years, Pat Anker, chair of the Eiteljorg Museum's Board of Directors from 2022 to 2024. Bob

exemplified the true spirit of volunteerism, civic pride and philanthropy, serving on the boards of multiple civic, professional and arts organizations.

Together, Bob and Pat hosted special events for Indian Market and Festival artists, Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellows, friends and staff. He enjoyed being asked for and offering ideas, assistance and encouragement. Stalwart supporters of the Eiteljorg, the couple generously participated in the Eye on the Future, Project New Moon, Project Silver Moon and Project 2021 capital campaigns. The Ankers joined the museum in 1999 and are Eagle Society donors.

At the Eiteljorg, Bob enjoyed Indian Market and Festival along with attending museum galas, *Quest for the West*[®], Buckaroo Bash, Cowpokes and Cocktails, exhibition openings, Eagle Society trips and receptions, public programs, and other special events. If Pat was at an event, inevitably Bob was by her side.

An actuary and insurance executive, Bob retired as chairman and CEO of American States Insurance. He loved visiting the Southwest, in particular Santa Fe, N.M., and spending time with his family. He was 81 when he passed on Aug. 4, 2023.

Margaret L. Archuleta (Tewa / Hispanic) 1950-2023

A scholar, curator and director of museums in the Southwest, Margaret L. Archuleta of Albuquerque served on the Eiteljorg's Native American Advisory Council. Her deep knowledge of Native art and artists, and her museum experience helped guide

the development of the Eiteljorg's newly reimagined Native American galleries.

At the Heard Museum in Phoenix, she curated a long-term exhibition about Native American boarding school experiences, and was the creative force behind the Native American Art Invitational, a forerunner to the Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship. She was well known for her passion and advocacy of contemporary Native art and artists, and was a friend of Eiteljorg curators. She was 72 when passed on March 26, 2023, and she is fondly remembered.

Mary Jane "Majie" Failey 1922-2023

A longtime Eiteljorg Museum supporter and former member of the Board of Directors and Board of Advisors, Mary Jane "Majie" Failey was a vivacious "people person" who enjoyed



introducing friends and acquaintances to community projects she loved. Majie became an Eiteljorg member in 1989, when the museum first opened its doors. She joined the Eagle Society, volunteered, became a founding member of the Western Art Society, attended museum events, enjoyed Indian Market and Festival and celebrated her 90th birthday at the Eiteljorg. Her friends became the museum's friends. She hosted social events promoting the museum during stays in Arizona. Always supportive, she contributed to the museum's endowment and to the *Eye on the Future* and *Project New Moon* capital campaigns.

Majie blazed a career path that created opportunities for future generations of women to follow. A newswoman in the 1940s, Majie became society editor of The *Indianapolis News* and later launched *Indianapolis Monthly* magazine. She was the author of three books, including one about her lifelong friendship with Hoosier author Kurt Vonnegut. Majie Failey was 100 years old when she died on Aug. 4, 2023.

Benjamin Harjo Jr. (Absentee Shawnee / Seminole)

1945-2023

Often described as "the Picasso of Native American Art," Benjamin Harjo Jr. of Oklahoma City was known for his paintings and prints that combine intense primary colors, geometric forms and

stylized figures. Influenced by Seminole designs and even comics and animation, Harjo's works convey a sense of humor and are found in prominent museums around the country. Known to Eiteljorg visitors from his regular participation in the annual Indian Market and Festival, Harjo created a work that is in the Eiteljorg's collections: the 1999 painting *Coyote and the Hummer*, which was on view during the exhibition *Laughter and Resilience: Humor in Native American Art* in 2021. Having studied at the Institute of American Indian Arts, Harjo served in the U.S. Army in the Vietnam War, then returned and earned his fine arts degree at Oklahoma State University. An admired alumnus of OSU, Harjo died May 20, 2023, and is survived by his wife and stepson. He was 77.

Marty Gradolf (Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska) 1955-2023

A longtime friend of the Eiteljorg Museum, artist Marty Gradolf participated for many years in the annual Eiteljorg Indian Market and Festival. In 2009, she was an artist in residence at the museum. Marty was a dear friend of former curator of contemporary art Jennifer Complo McNutt. Two of Marty's works *According to Webster...* (2001) and "Indian" Sells (2004) are part of the Eiteljorg's permanent collections. A resident of Brown County, Indiana, and part of its vibrant local arts scene, Marty was known for her distinct contemporary weavings, as well as for the workshops she taught about hand—dyed natural fibers.

Dee Ketchum (Delaware **Tribe of Indians**)

1938-2023

Central Indiana residents remember Dee Ketchum and his wife Annette as cultural educators who presented programs about the Delaware people during annual events at the Eiteljorg, Conner Prairie and in Anderson, Indiana. A former chief of the Delaware Tribe of Indians, Dee engaged visitors

with dances, songs and stories. The Ketchums helped create and present a Delaware Cultural Day at the Eiteljorg in 2009. Featured in the WFYI TV documentary, Long Journey Home: The Delawares of Indiana, they also gifted a Delaware men's Straight Dance outfit to the museum's collection. A business leader, coach and educator in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, Dee Ketchum is remembered today as one of that state's great studentathletes. He died March 26, 2023, at age 84.

Jerry D. Semler 1937-2023

Businessman, community and civic leader Jerry D. Semler was proclaimed a Hoosier living legend by the Indiana Historical Society. Married for 63 years, Jerry and his wife Rosie became Eiteljorg Museum supporters in 1990, Image Courtesy ut OneAmerica Financial but his relationship with the museum's




mission began even earlier. Jerry served on the board of the former Indian Heritage Museum at Eagle Creek Park when its collection merged with that of the Eiteljorg. Members of the Eiteljorg for 33 years, the Semlers also donated to the Eagle Society and the Eye on the Future capital campaign.

During his time as CEO of AUL (now OneAmerica Financial), Jerry championed many other Eiteljorg programs. With his support, AUL became presenting sponsor of Indian Market and Festival from 2003-2005, and helped sponsor Ansel Adams: A Life's Work, New Art of the West 8, From One Hand to Another and Cowboys, Settlers and Soldiers: African Americans in the West. AUL also contributed to the Eye on the Future endowment and capital campaigns.

Jerry's life of service to the community was recognized by two Indiana governors with two Sagamore of the Wabash awards. He served on the boards of - and as chairman for — many arts, historic, educational and civic organizations. Jerry Semler died July 24, 2023; he was 86.

Storyteller magazine wins state's highest PR award

The Eiteljorg's <u>Storyteller magazine</u> in 2023 was judged the best public relations project in Indiana by an independent panel of experts representing the Public Relations Society of America, Hoosier Chapter.

On May 10, 2023, the Eiteljorg's Marketing and Communications team competed in the Pinnacle Awards contest presented by PRSA, and won a statewide award for excellence. The competition recognized the best projects and programs in the public relations industry in Indiana for work done during 2022.

During two prior years, the Eiteljorg's *Storyteller* magazine won the Pinnacle Award for best magazine — the top award given in that category. At the 2023 competition, *Storyteller* won the PRSA Best of Show award, meaning it was judged the best public relations project of any type submitted, in all categories entered.

PRSA judges' comments about *Storyteller:* "Wow! The entire project is one that deserves much recognition. Assembling content, people, writers and resources takes careful planning and consideration — it's clear the *Storyteller* team did that — all while keeping the museum's overall goals in check. An incredible feat to have the magazine 'fulfill its yearlong purpose in advocating for museum exhibits, programs and fundraising."

The Best of Show at the Pinnacle Awards is the highest public relations project award given in Indiana, and the highest award the Eiteljorg's marketing department has ever received in this annual competition. The museum's team that worked on this project included public relations manager and *Storyteller* editor Bryan Corbin and graphic designer Mike Fasig of Honeymoon Image & Design. Also recognized were several former employees: past executive vice president and chief advancement officer Nataly Lowder, past director of marketing and communications Bert Beiswanger, and past digital marketing managers Brooke Sullivan, Dani Vasquez and Sophia Holt-Wilson.
